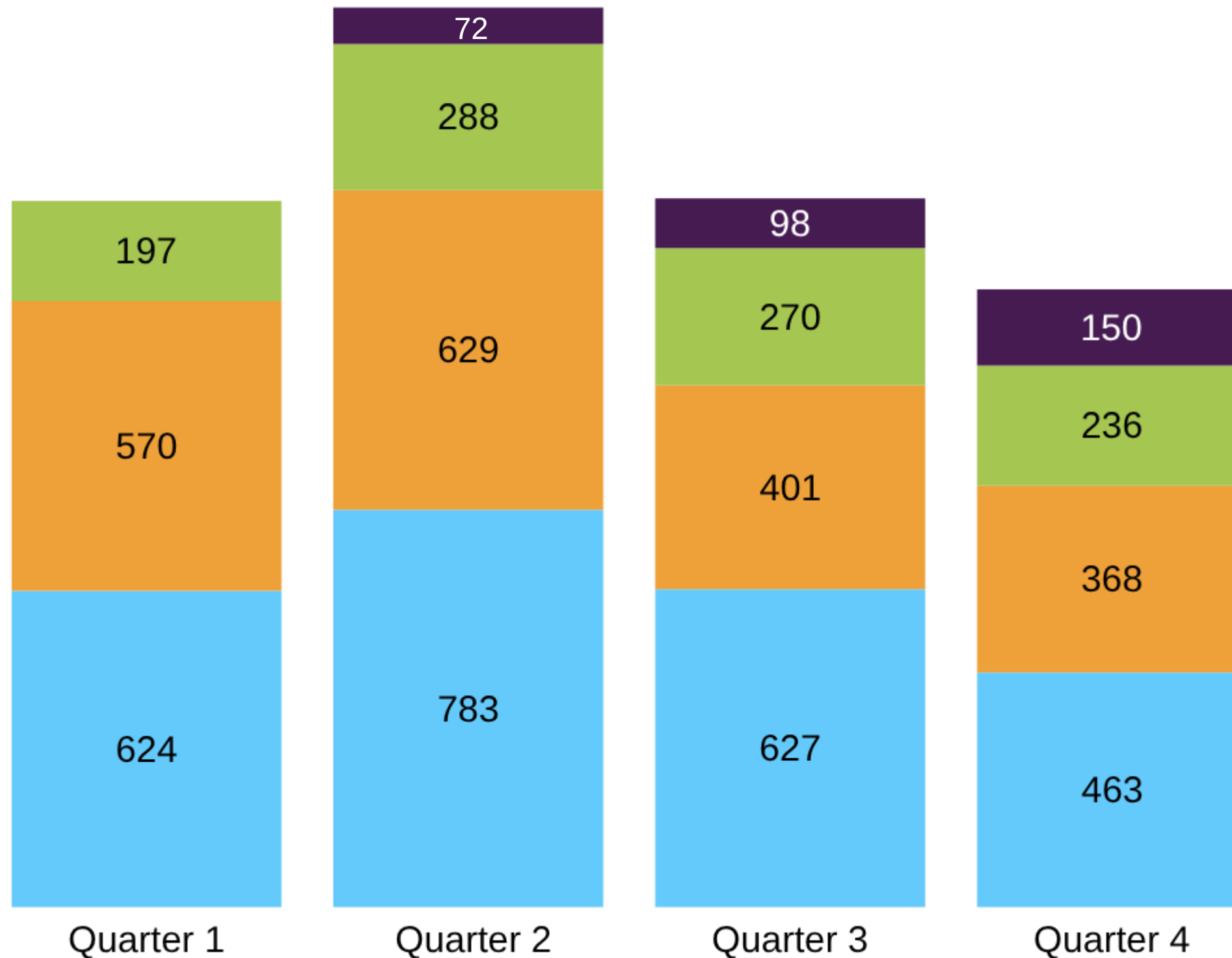


Prop 47 Cohort 4 Year 1 Review

64.1% Enrollment Rate in Q4 (236/368)

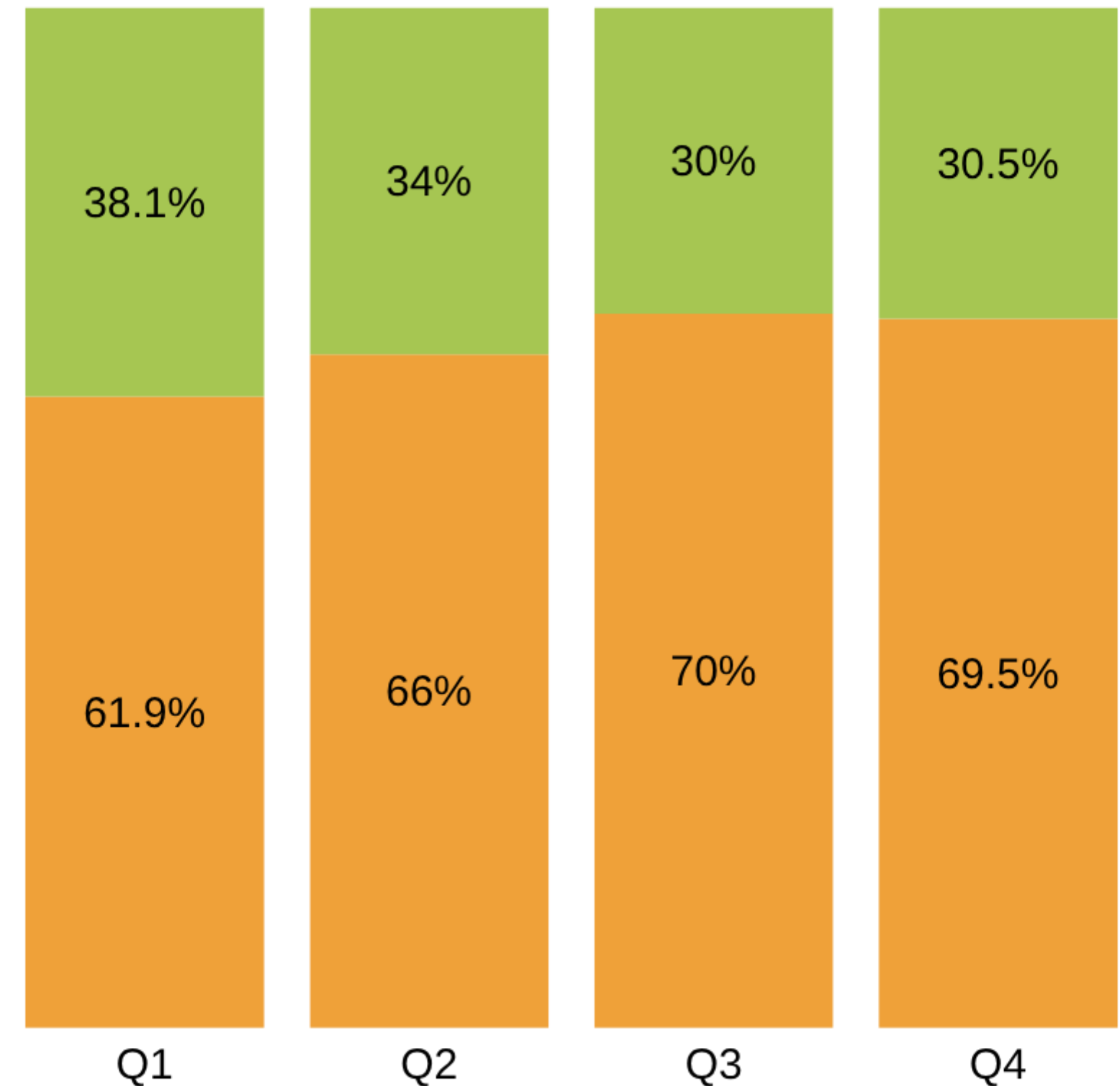
67.3% Enrollment Rate in Q3 (270/401)

Jail Screening:

- Prop 47 In Custody Referral List
- Over 500 direct referrals received during Year 1 from Adult Correctional Mental Health Social Workers
- Public Defender's, Conflict Criminal Defender's, and District Attorney's offices

Walk-in/Outside Agency:

- Probation, 211, El Hogar, Wellspace, BACS, and various other community-based organizations

Total Program Exits: 398

Shelter Placement



Reasons for Exits:

- Permanent Housing Found: **24**
- Moved to SLE, Residential Treatment, ARC program, VA, or Room and Board: **41**
- Relocated Out of County: **10**
- Released to Family: **15**
- Self-Check-out: **20**
- Re-Arrested (while housed at shelter resulting in bed being released): **9**
- Breaking Facility/Program Rules: **125**
- No-Show or Whereabouts Unknown: **150**
- Reached Maximum Stay Limit (RH): **4**

Average Length of Program Participation for “Exiters” = 55 days

Shelter Statistics

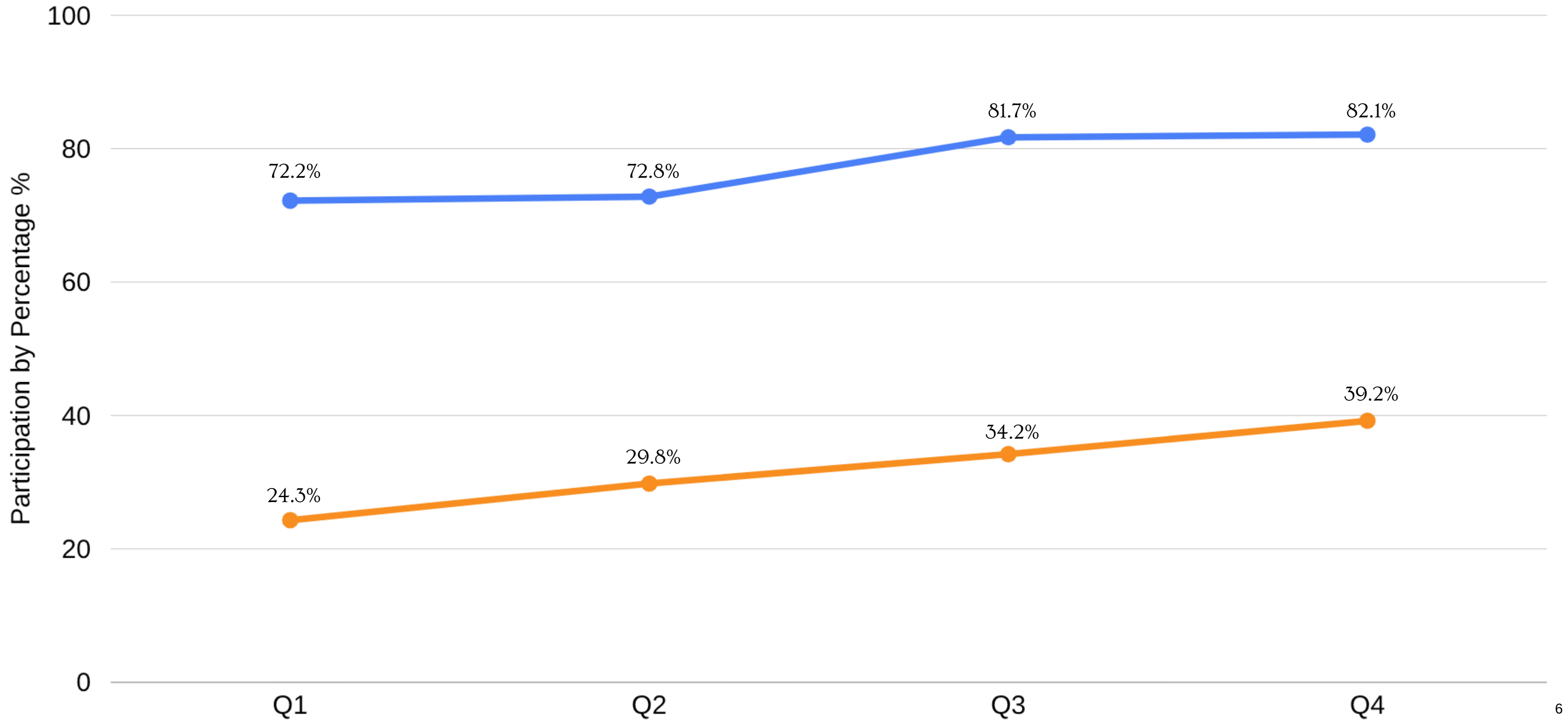
Since program start:

- **278** program participants maintained shelter stays exceeding 30 days
- **180** participants maintained shelter stays exceeding 60 days
- **125** participants maintained shelter stays exceeding 90 days
- **46** participants maintained shelter stays exceeding 180 days

Participants housed with The Salvation Army, Renewed Hope, First Step Communities and City Net DSHS Safe Stays, Bridges, Volunteers of America, City of Sacramento, and Exodus' Sober Living Home

Recidivism Data

Recidivism data for Quarter 1 - Quarter 3 (July 1, 2025 - March 31, 2026) participants was submitted to the Board of State and Community Corrections in August

Data shows that:

- **34.7%** of participants were convicted of a new felony or misdemeanor after their enrollment date in the ROAR program (262/756 participants)
 - 90 Misdemeanors
 - 172 Felonies
- **65.3%** of participants did not receive any new convictions
- **29%** of ROAR program exiters returned to custody less often than before their program participation
- **90%** of ROAR program exiters had no returns to custody within the 6-month period following their exit

Program Successes

- **31** previously exited participants re-enrolled in the program throughout Year 1
- **158** total program completions

- **80** housing and care transition completions

(stably housed, either independently or with family/relatives/friends, or their care has been transitioned with the intent that long-term support will further be provided by another service provider via transitional housing, sober living, or residential treatment where they no longer need ongoing case management offered through our program)

- **78** treatment engagement completions

(successfully engaged in Mental Health and/or Substance Use Disorder treatment and show a commitment to maintaining their treatment)

Progress Towards Goals

Goal 1: Reduce Recidivism and Returns to Custody

- Increase participation in reentry programs
- Strengthen relationships between service providers for prerelease and reentry services and service recipients

What ROAR is doing:

- Engaging daily with eligible participants
- Building trusting, supportive relationships
- Providing mentorship and guidance to help participants navigate the reentry process
- Building a sustainable framework that supports stability

Year 1 data shows promise that we are seeing an impact in reducing the number of returns to custody among participants

Progress Towards Goals

Goal 2: Reduce Homelessness for Program Participants

- Increase re-housing for people exiting jail
- Reduce unemployment for program participants

Challenges:

- Frequent shelter exits
- Participation in employment programs

Addressing Challenges:

- Shelter exits have become less frequent as the program continues
 - Increased engagement in workshops and with treatment providers
- Many participants have been successful in gaining employment via the support of Exodus' Employment Specialist and The Salvation Army's Case Managers
 - The program anticipates higher rates of employment following SETA's Cohort 5 employment program roll out

Progress Towards Goals

Goal 3: Increase Access and Participation in Mental Health and Substance Use Prevention and Treatment Services (SUPT) for Program Participants

- Increase access for SUPT services
- Expand mentorship programs for justice-involved individuals in MH and SUPT services

Notable Findings:

- The program is seeing increases in engagement in Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder treatment each quarter

The County has expanded its capacity through the CalAIM Justice Involved Initiative, which goes live October 1st, and will improve coordination between jail-based and outpatient Behavioral Health service linkage

Program Updates - CalAIM Justice Involved (JI)

- Go-live October 1
- 90 days of pre-release service billing available for those with active Medi-Cal
- Reentry planning focus for those with release dates, including linkage to:
 - Medi-Cal Managed Care Plans, and associated benefits/services
 - Community JI Enhanced Care Management Providers
 - Behavioral Health Services, when applicable
- Prop 47 will operate parallel to the CalAIM JI program and will continue to focus on the quick release population, those without release dates, and those without/pending Medi-Cal enrollment
